University and Independent College	Public	13,600	<p>1. Children of civil servants residing in Taiwan, Penghu, Kinmen, and Matsu, who are officially enrolled in government-approved public and private schools from college level down to elementary school, can apply for child education subsidies according to regulations.</p> <p>2. Application deadline: For the first semester of the academic year, apply to this agency or school before October 25; for the second semester, apply before April 10.</p> <p>3. Application procedures and required documents: (i) Fill out the application form: The applicant should apply based on the principle of honesty. After verification by the personnel department, payment will be processed in a bookkeeping manner. (ii) Household registration: When applying for the first time at this agency, a household registration is required to confirm the parent-child relationship. Subsequently, unless the parent-child relationship of the applicant changes, the applicant must proactively notify the personnel department, and no further submission is required. (iii) Receipts: No need for junior high and elementary schools; public and private high schools (vocational) and above need to submit receipts. If a photocopy is submitted, it should be signed by the applicant. If unable to submit a receipt, other documents sufficient to prove the fact of tuition fee payment (payment) can be submitted, along with the original payment notice.</p> <p>4. Children of civil servants are limited to those who are unmarried, jobless, and dependent on the applicant. When civil servants apply for child education subsidies, if their unmarried children continue to engage in regular work, and their average monthly income in the six months before the start of school (income reported under the Income Tax Act) exceeds the basic wage of labor, they are considered employed and are not eligible for subsidies.</p> <p>5. Children of civil servants who meet any of the following conditions are not eligible to apply for child education subsidies. However, this does not include recipients of scholarships for outstanding students, scholarships for the poor, scholarships from private organizations, and those who attend junior high and elementary schools and have not received full (reduced) tuition fees or government scholarships due to special status: (i) Full or reduced tuition fees (including twelve-year basic education tuition subsidies). (ii) Students of schools or cram schools without student status. (iii) Selective students of public and private secondary schools and above. (iv) Students of schools without a specific duration of study. (v) Those who have already received public funding, reduced tuition fees, and other benefits under the Act of Education Tuition Benefits for the Survivors of Military and Civil Servants. (vi) Those who have already received other government scholarships (subsidies).</p> <p>6. Except for children of civil servants who attend junior high and elementary schools and have not received full (reduced) tuition fees and government scholarships due to special status, and apply for child education subsidies according to the table, if the actual tuition fees paid are lower than the amount stipulated in the child education subsidy table, they can only apply for subsidies for the actual amount paid.</p> <p>7. When civil servants apply for child education subsidies, it should be based on the fact that their children have completed the registration process for the current semester during their employment period. The application should be based on the duration of study stipulated by schools at all levels. If there are cases of transfer, change of department, re-examination, retention, or retaking, the repeated years of study in the same education system will not be subsidized. Also, those who re-enter the same education system after graduation are not eligible.</p> <p>8. If both spouses are civil servants, they should coordinate and apply for child education subsidies from one party.</p> <p>9. For those who are suspended from work due to a case, if the fact that they can apply for child education subsidies occurs during the suspension period, they can apply for a retroactive payment to this agency or school within three months after resuming work according to regulations. The amount should be calculated based on the regulations at the time of the occurrence of the fact.</p> <p>10. Children of civil servants attending public and private high schools (vocational) comprehensive high school classes (including specialized programs for second grade and above), non-comprehensive high school classes of vocational categories, and general classes, should receive child education subsidies according to the amount for public and private high schools and vocational high schools.</p>
